
Boat Steward Program Becomes Reality

Starting this boating season, a Boat Steward Program will be in place at the Black Lake boat launch on County Route #6. After several years of hard work and perseverance this has finally come to reality!

You might wonder, what exactly is a Boat Steward Program and why do we need one? Basically the program involves conducting voluntary boat/trailer inspections and delivering education and outreach to recreational boaters to prevent the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS). Black Lake currently has several invasive species – Eurasian watermilfoil, zebra mussels, curly leaf pondweed, and European frogbit. The first two have been more damaging to our water quality than the others.

The Boat Steward inspections will focus on keeping NEW INVASIVES out of Black Lake, and preventing EXISTING INVASIVES from spreading to other waterbodies. There are numerous invasives we do not have — both plant and animal — that can significantly threaten water quality and recreational activities. Black Lake is one of NY State's top fishing destinations, with the public launch accessed regularly by out-of-state/region boaters who travel from waterbody to waterbody, as well as those who fish the St. Lawrence, which is susceptible to foreign AIS from ocean going vessels.

By keeping new AIS out of Black Lake and working to reduce existing AIS, native aquatic species have a better opportunity to survive and thrive, keeping an ecological balance. The earlier the detection of new invasives, the higher the probability of eradication, as pictured in the "Invasion Curve" graph.


Monthly Photo Contest Starts in May

IRLC Water Project Grant Shared with Black Lake

The Indian River Lakes Conservancy (IRLC) was the recipient last year of a land trust grant to establish a water project in the Indian River Lakes Watershed.

After reading an article in our Fall 2015 newsletter regarding a membership drive, Ed Robertson, the Chair of this water project for IRLC, contacted us regarding the challenge we articulated in that article to reach out to "the high percentage of hard to reach seasonal property owners, who only enjoy the lake for a week or two, a month, or a summer season, yet impact the lake and its environment along with everyone else."

Ed asked:: "Because Black Lake has more property owners (950+) than all of the other 17 Indian River Lakes combined, would we be interested in using \$2,500 of their grant funds to reach out to our fellow Black Lakers in an effort to get them to join our Association?" Of course, we said yes! We know that communication is key, and getting more people to join and informed on a consistent basis is critical.

As a result we are using the funds for two direct mailings to all property owners inviting them to our FREE Ice Cream Social on July 6th.



Financial Update

As your new Treasurer, I would first like to thank all the members who have paid dues for 2016 and beyond (88%). Receiving this revenue early in the year ensures that the initiatives we planned and budgeted can be financially implemented. For those of you who have not yet paid for 2016, please send your check for \$25 to Black Lake Association, PO Box 308, Hammond NY 13646.

Our current financial condition is sound with a checking account balance of \$4,837 and regular savings of \$10,021. We also invested \$5,000 in January 2016 with Vanguard in order to earn better interest -- \$237 so far this year. We can withdraw the funds anytime we need them with no penalty.

We do have some major expenses coming up that have not yet been paid, such as NYSFOLA Conference, CSLAP Fees, BL Chamber Guide and our upcoming membership drive and ice cream social. In addition, we have designated \$7,000 match towards the NYS Boat Steward grant that will be spent over the 3-year period of the grant. The Board approved a deficit budget for 2016 because of the planned extraordinary expenses this year. Our financial condition remains strong.

BOAT STEWARD PROGRAM

Boat Steward Program (continued)



After conducting an Outreach / Education weekend last August with NYS Parks, they became aware of the volume of traffic that typically frequents our boat launch. As a result, they agreed to rotate their Boat Steward to

Black Lake every Saturday throughout the summer starting in 2016.

In addition, last December, a Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) grant was announced by Governor Cuomo to initiate a \$2 million "New York Aquatic Invasive Species Spread Prevention Program." We applied in January and were notified on April 27 that we were awarded the full 3-year grant! The project cost is \$49,500, with the grant covering \$35,950. The match funds totaling the remaining \$13,550 were pledged as follows:

As the priority of the NYS AIS Grant was "regional" in nature, versus a focus on one lake, we partnered with the Goose Bay Reclamation Corporation to secure one Boat Steward to be shared between Black Lake and Goose Bay on the St. Lawrence River.

In addition, there are Indian River lake associations that will be participating in multiple Outreach / Education Days at three DEC boat launches. These include the Butterfield Lake Cottage Owners Association, the Grass Lake Association, the Millsite Lake Property Owners Association and the Lake of the Woods Association. Each of these associations is in the beginning stages of considering their own boat steward program,

and are eager to learn how they work, how they can help prevent the spread of AIS, and why it is important so they can share this with their membership and property owners.

Volunteers from each of these associations will work side-by-side with the paid Boat Steward at their respective launches to see first-hand how to approach boaters, what to look for, how to inspect boats/equipment and how to document/report each encounter.

We are contracting for our Boat Steward with the Adirondack Watershed Institute Stewardship Program at Paul Smith's College. They have a depth of experience with boat steward programs in the Adirondack Park, and are willing to share that knowledge with us through these services. They will recruit, hire, train and educate our boat steward, as well as train our volunteers in the appropriate and successful techniques of boat steward programs.

A Boat Steward is planned, as follows, for our launch four days a week throughout the summer – Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, when traffic is most heavy.

Boat Steward Volunteers Needed

One of the things we articulated in our grant application to DEC was our willingness to implement a "volunteer boat steward program" to supplement a paid steward at the boat launch. This demonstrates that we, as an Association, are vested in the long-term health of the lake

We are looking for people to volunteer on Thursdays for 2-4 hours to supplement the paid stewards at our boat launch. Boat inspections are voluntary, so our approach is non-confrontational, educational interaction with boaters. Our goal is to educate them about how to check for aquatic invasive species (AIS) and why it is important to check, both coming "in" and "out" of Black Lake. Volunteer Boat Steward Training will be provided.

NYSFOLA CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

NYSFOLA 2016 Conference "The Water is Great in New York State"

The New York State Federation of Lake Associations, Inc. (NYSFOLA) just completed the weekend conference at White Eagle Conference Center, Hamilton, NY on beautiful Lake Moraine. This 33rd year of the conference had over 235 attendees gathered to learn and participate in important lake-related activities. With over 7,800 lakes, ponds and reservoirs in our state, NYSFOLA is the go-to organization; this is the pre-eminent conference to learn about lake law, pollution control issues, invasive species—their ongoing invasion and possible controls, dam safety, water quality monitoring, agricultural/residential impacts as well as multiple and competing priorities for our waterbodies.

Friday through Sunday morning there were 48 sessions to choose from. A track for boat launch steward programs was popular. Director Ron Perry and volunteer member Jim Staples from the Black Lake Association participated in anticipation of our starting a boat steward program this summer. Also full was iMapInvasives—a comprehensive data base growing with input from cellphones and laptops of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) around the state. The Point Intercept Rake Toss was demonstrated for the evaluation and identification of AIS.

The Citizens Statewide Lake Assessment Program (CSLAP) training, in both classroom setting to explain sampling requirements and actual on-boat training on Lake Moraine to learn Secchi disk and Kemmerer bottle use, was at capacity. Black Lake Association volunteers Alan Boekhout and Jim Staples participated on our behalf. They will provide back-up support to our CSLAP volunteer member, Mike Powell.

Finger Lakes Institute and DEC had microscopes with actual lake samples to teach identification of microscopic animals and algae. There were numerous sessions describing what we know about Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs) and methods to deal with them: alerts to treatments. The program contained case studies demonstrating how lakes employ different methods to control AIS with varying success. Talks on septic system management, manure spreading and feeding lot regulations offer understanding of nutrient loading.

Presentations on effective use of social media and strategies to form or grow lake associations proved to be in demand. NYSFOLA's attorney, David Wright presented Lake Law 2016 with updates on lake legal issues and interesting litigation. For fun we had a Paint-A-Lake session for aspiring artists, the annual Wine and Cheese Party, the Silent Auction, the Wine Auction and four raffles with proceeds benefiting NYSFOLA. Centrally located, and affordable, this conference is a must for lake enthusiasts.

Congratulations to Director Rich Henderson, who was elected President of NYSFOLA at this conference. He has been a member of NYSFOLA's Board of Directors since 2011. Rich is Past President of our Association and a member of our Board since 2005.

First timers at NYSFOLA from ourAssociation share some thoughts with members.

- Ron Perry noted: "Raising the awareness of lake issues and how they affect each of us and our property, would probably help to increase volunteers as much, or more than anything we can do."
- Alan Bockhout commented that: "It was a good opportunity to meet a fellow camp owner from an entirely different area of the lake and share notes about our experience over the years."

• Jim Staples said this about the boat steward workshop he attended: "The key theme was to standardize the program for all — procedures, forms, even the red shirts — so boaters from all over the state will recognize us as a cohesive program dedicated to controlling AIS."
